PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

The end of the year is a few weeks away but our students are still working hard and interested in what they are learning. Here are a few highlights from this week.

Early Primary - Students are bug experts - aka - Entomologists. Yes, they know this word, can pronounce it (mostly) and know a lot about bugs. Did you know that spiders are considered bugs, just like insects? There are differences between insects and spiders and students informed me of them when I visited. First, insects have three parts (head, abdomen and thorax) but spiders have two (head and cephalothorax). Insects have two antennae and 6 legs. They sometimes have wings but spiders don't. Spiders have 8 legs and 8 eyes. Lilly is a bit afraid of spiders (same with some of her classmates and teachers). However, they know that spiders have an important job in nature and pledged to bring them outside if they see them in their house, not squish them. Last fact they told me - Daddy Long Legs are NOT spiders.

Primary - Students are researching careers that many community helpers do - firefighters, police officers, construction workers/builders, doctors, teachers, farmers and veterinarians. When I visited their classroom, they were creating a "want ad" using what they learned about their job responsibilities, education and training and personal characteristics. Firefighters must be brave - we all know that but did you know they also have to

have medical training? Builders must be precise (direct quote from Charlie). Doctors must be prepared for long hours and less family time than other professions.

Intermediate - In 4th grade math this week, students were learning about geometry. They used protractors to measure acute, right and obtuse angles. Didn't we learn this in middle school?

Upper Intermediate - Students are learning about the Civil War and the important historical figures who made an impact. They are researching information about the person of their choice and making research based claims (opinions) and supporting them with evidence. Elana's claim about Harriet Tubman is that her most important contribution was freeing slaves. She led many to freedom through the Underground Railroad, but did you know that Harriet was also a military leader who organized African American troops in fighting the Confederacy? Students are researching Abraham Lincoln, Fredrick Douglass, Sojourner Truth, Jefferson Davisto name a few. In the beginning of the unit, they learned about James Brown and had to take a stance, based on evidence from an article, and determine if he was a hero or a terrorist. In the end, they learned it all depends on the point of view of the individual. A person can sometimes be both.

We are so proud of our students and all they have accomplished this year. Be sure to put the Celebration of Learning on June 3rd at 5:30, on your calendar. Students are ready to brag to you (and teach you) about what they have learned and show you how they've grown. Not only as students but as artists and musicians. We hope to see you there.

Revision to last week's Principal's Corner

Last week I described all of the ways our school community has made connections with the Norfolk community. A HUGE omission on my part was mentioning our collaboration with Miss Eileen and the Norfolk Library. Miss Eileen volunteers to read in our classrooms. She plans engaging after school programs for our students throughout the year. We collaborate on our Summer Reading Programs and she led a station on Earth Day where students learned about pollinators - what they are and why they are important. They made a seed bomb to take home a plant. They also listened to a nature story and donated the book to classroom libraries.
